Kindergarten: Our smallest children are coming to the library every week to learn information literacy skills while enjoying a story. This month they have learned about authors, illustrators, Caldecott awards and main characters.

First Grade: Students are coming in regularly to check out books and learn ET-IL skills. In January, they have been introduced to the Dewey Decimal system, reading spine labels and locating books in the nonfiction section. Google Earth helped us travel to the moon.
